## 'Battle's Over', a nation's tribute

November 11 2018 marks the 100th year since the guns fell silent, signalling the end of the First World War.

In remembering the sacrifice of millions of men and women, Oadby & Wigston Borough Council will be joining "Battle's Over", a unique series of events in the morning and evening, involving organisations and communities the length and breadth of our nation and many countries abroad.

In remembrance of the end of the war, over 1,000 Beacons of Light will be lit throughout the UK at 7p.m. to symbolise the light of hope that emerged from the darkness of war. Oadby & Wigston Borough Council will be lighting a beacon at Brocks Hill Country Park.

The event also commemorates the many men and women on the home front who underpinned the war effort by keeping the wheels of industry turning and bringing home the harvests. Further details of remembrance events in Oadby, Wigston and South Wigston will be published on the Council website in October.

# Meet your new Mayor

# Oadby Remembers 1914-1918

Oadby Remembers 1914-1918 is a community project affiliated to the Imperial War Museum First World War Centenary. It is supported by the Oadby & Wigston Borough Council Residents Forum, the Oadby Village Hall Trust, Oadby Education Foundation and Leicester Diocese.

The project was conceived in April 2014 with the aim of recognising not only the sacrifice made by the 73 men named on the Oadby War Memorial, but also the hardship suffered by the survivors and their families. Our research has uncovered a further seven casualties with links to Oadby whose stories are included.

The project is specific to Oadby's story of the war and will culminate in a commemorative book in 2019, for the benefit of the community. This addition to the local history archive will present a biographical story for each of the 80 men who fell and a picture of life on the Oadby Home Front, showing how personal tragedy and war time politics affected everyday life in the village.

In doing so we want to pull together the large and varied number of family stories, photographs and historical memorabilia from the First World War which we know exist in Oadby. In 1914 Oadby was a village of some 2,800 people, yet today it is a large multi-cultural town. Part of our aim with the Oadby Remembers 1914-1918 project is to recognise the contribution made by these 'Old Oadby' families to the history of our town and to the war. But additionally to demonstrate the price paid by Imperial Forces and their links to the soldiers from Oadby who they fought alongside.

Our group comprises eight volunteers, including military historians, family history researchers, local historians and archivists. We have also enlisted the support of further historians with specific subject knowledge, in presenting exhibitions and a programme of illustrated talks.

Oadby Remembers 1914-1918 has established contact with soldiers' descendants who attend commemoration services in memory of their ancestors and made contact with previously unknown members of their extended families.

We have created a website, [www.oadbyremembers.org.uk](http://www.oadbyremembers.org.uk), where all exhibitions and additional information about local soldiers can be viewed. ## Get involved

The Oadby Community Stakeholders, as part of the Oadby Remembers 1914-1918 project, would like to invite individuals, families, schools, and community organisations to take part in a community activity to honour Oadby's fallen.

One hundred years ago over 400 Oadby men and women enlisted to serve their country, of whom 80 did not return. The aim is to create a community mural featuring 80 decorated silhouettes, demonstrating the scale of the village's sacrifice.

The 5ft soldiers can be decorated any way you like to reflect something of the individual or group creating it. Each silhouette will bear the name of one of the fallen and a biography of your soldier can also be provided, so that they might become a real personality rather than just a name on the war memorial.

During Remembrance weekend all 80 figures will come together in St Peter's Centre opposite the War Memorial, to be viewed alongside the commemorative Oadby Remembers 1914-1918 exhibition.

# Have your say

## Future Local Plan Consultation

Oadby & Wigston Borough Council's Planning Department regularly undertakes wide ranging public consultations and offer people living or working in the Borough the opportunity to have a say in what they like about the area, as well as how they would like to see things change.

To achieve this the Council is encouraging residents and business owners to contact the Planning Department so that they can be added to the Local Plan consultation database.

## The Local Plan consultation database

As part of each public consultation undertaken by the Planning Department, individuals and other stakeholders are sent a letter to make them aware of the consultation, where the relevant consultation material can be found and how to submit a comment.

On the May 18, 2018 the Planning Department sent a letter to everyone on the Local Plan consultation database, asking whether they wish to remain on the database and if so, that the Council had permission to hold the consultee details. Although the response was positive, the number of consultees that are now held on the Local Plan consultation database has significantly decreased.

To ensure that the Planning Department is continuing to do all it can to consult on the Local Plan process, it is encouraging individuals and organisations to sign up to the Local Plan consultation database.

Please note, the Local Plan consultation database is only relevant for ongoing and future public consultations relating to the Local Plan itself and any other planning policy document that is subject to public consultation. The database is not related to development management or planning control public consultations that are related to planning applications.

## Uplands Park outdoor gym

The outdoor gym equipment currently installed in Uplands Park, Oadby, is reaching the end of its life and residents are being asked for their views on replacement equipment.

The concept of an outdoor gym has grown in popularity over the last few years with studies showing that exercising outdoors can have additional health benefits of both lowering blood pressure and reducing stress.

Five items of outdoor gym equipment were installed into Uplands Park in 2010 and the area has since proved very popular. Following discussions with residents at Oadby Forum, funding has been made available to replace the existing equipment and increase the number of items available. A public consultation will run throughout September to gain the views of residents.

# Re-opening of Florence Wragg play area

On Friday July 13 the newly refurbished play area at Florence Wragg Way re-opened, just in time for the summer holidays.

The project was started in 2017 when residents approached the Council asking for new equipment to be installed. A public consultation followed, with residents and children being invited to submit their thoughts on the type of equipment they would like installed.

Council officers used the consultation results to draw up a specification for the equipment, which included swings for all ages and abilities and two slides; one for toddlers and one for juniors. The junior slide is incorporated into a bespoke climbing unit which offers a fun challenge for users, as the slide can only be accessed via monkey bars or a climbing wall.

Ward councillors Dean Gamble and Bhupen Dave, and local resident Sanjay Mistry, were involved in the project and have kept a keen eye on progress.

The new equipment, which cost £46,000, has been entirely funded by Section 106 Contributions - money paid to the Council by a developer to mitigate the impact of new homes and other buildings which create extra demand on facilities. Oadby & Wigston Borough Council appointed Wicksteed Leisure to implement the scheme after a competitive tender process.

The new equipment includes toddler and junior swings, a basket swing, two climbing units suitable for children up to 12 years, a springy and a 'swirl' roundabout accessible for users of all abilities including wheelchair users.

Florence Wragg play area has open public access and can be found off Florence Wragg Way in Oadby.

# Introducing Universal Credit

Universal Credit is a new benefit administered by the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP). For working age claimant's it will replace: Tax Credits, Job Seekers Allowance (Income Based), Income Support, Employment Support Allowance (Income Related) and Housing Benefit. This means you will claim Universal Credit instead.



If you already receive any of the benefits listed above these benefits will continue. However, if you have a change of circumstances you will be advised if you will need to claim Universal Credit.

## I'm a pensioner, will it affect me?

Universal Credit does not apply to single claimants or couples of pension age. In these cases, you will continue to claim Pension Credit and/or Housing Benefit.

However, where you are a member of a couple where only one of you is pension age you will have the option of switching to Universal Credit.

## How do I claim Universal Credit?

You will need to make a claim online. Support is available from the Council or job centre if you do not have access to a computer, tablet or smartphone, or if you need help in completing the claim.

## Can I claim if I am working?

Yes. Whether you qualify will depend on your income and not the hours you work, so if you receive Universal Credit and move into, or out of work, your payments will be adjusted and you won't need to make a new claim, as long as you still qualify.

## When will I get paid Universal Credit?

Universal Credit is paid a month in arrears and you should receive your first payment five weeks after you claim. Payments will be made direct to your bank account. If you can't wait five weeks for your first payment, you can ask for an advanced payment loan, but be aware that this will need to be paid back each month over a maximum of twelve months.

## Additional support

If you need help managing your money, please contact the Council or the work coach at your job centre.

## Will Council Tax Support be included in my Universal Credit?

No, you will need to claim Council Tax Support separately. You can do this online, by visiting the Customer Service Centre or by calling the Council. Any Council Tax Support award will be credited to your Council Tax bill. You will be responsible for paying your Council Tax.

## Will free school meals be included in my Universal Credit?

No, these will need to be claimed separately via Leicestershire County Council or at your child's school.

## Discretionary payments

If you claim Universal Credit and you pay rent and/or Council Tax you can still claim for Discretionary Housing Payments or Discretionary Council Tax Support from the Council.

## Renting your home

This section applies to Council tenants, Housing Association tenants and tenants of Private Landlords. Rent is known as 'housing costs' under the new Universal Credit scheme and any money paid towards your housing costs will be included in your monthly lump sum payment. You are responsible for paying your rent.

## How do I pay my rent?

You should speak to your landlord immediately about paying your rent (ideally by setting up a direct debit) or if you get into difficulty with your rent payments.

## Can my rent be paid direct to my landlord?

Yes, but only in limited circumstances. Please speak to your landlord or the DWP for more information.

## Wildflowers at Brocks Hill



Once autumn arrives, many wildflowers at the country park fade to be replaced by the warm hues of the season. But over summer, many types of wildflower bloomed: bright oxeye daisies, deep purple knapweed, yellow bird's-foot trefoil, lady's bedstraw and delicate pink musk mallow.

Some of the smallest flowers, such as red and white clover are favoured by pollinators such as bees, which feed on nectar in early summer. This year has been very good for butterflies and bees, with some of the highest numbers of butterflies recorded at the country park and over 500 bumblebees recorded in one survey in July.

Some of the most important plants in the country park are the wildflowers, also known as weeds. These plants aren't tolerated in gardens, formal parks or on agricultural land, but nevertheless they are native wildflowers that are essential food-plants for hundreds of important insects such as beetles, butterflies, hoverflies, moths and more.

Management aims to control some of these weeds where possible, but in other areas plants such as thistles, ragwort and burdock are allowed to flower and set seed. Without these plants growing in the more disturbed areas, there would be less food-plants for many important insects, upon which we depend for pollinating our food crops and all of our flowers.

## Local businesses join 'Dementia friendly' campaign

A group of Police Community Support Officers are the latest to become 'Dementia Friends' as part of a campaign to tackle the stigma and lack of understanding around Dementia and Alzheimer's.

Other groups attended free one-hour information sessions at Oadby Trinity Methodist Church, next to Zeph's café, run by local Dementia Friends Champion, Lesley Green. Speaking about the session, Lesley said: "I was so pleased to see business people showing their support for people with Dementia, by coming along to the session and becoming Dementia Friends.

"I am part of the local Dementia Forum and we aim to help businesses in Oadby, Wigston and South Wigston be more "Dementia Friendly" so those affected feel understood and included. Dementia Champions are ready to run more free sessions locally. Our aim is for our Borough to be known for being Dementia Friendly".

Mayor David Carter has chosen the Alzheimer's Society as his chosen charity and is delighted to support this initiative. Oadby & Wigston Borough Council has also recognised Dementia as one of their main priorities.



# A helpful recycling reminder

## What can go in your new wheelie bin for recycling?

Just a reminder that all your items for recycling can be placed into the new brown-lid wheelie bin, where they will be sorted into different material streams at Casepak. The materials are sorted using high tech machinery then baled and passed on to other organisations for reprocessing before being recycled into new items. Find out more at [www.lesswaste.org.uk](http://www.lesswaste.org.uk).

Though all recyclable items are now collected together, the quality of the materials that are sent for recycling is important and it does make a difference. A few points to remember:

- Empty and rinse - leftover food or liquids can contaminate other items and affect the quality of the materials. Equally, paper and card that is dirty or stained with food or grease cannot be recycled.
- Lids on – lids can be left on all bottles, jars and cartons, whether they're made from plastic, glass or tetra pak. This will ensure that the lids are captured. Lids for food tins can be popped inside the tin.
- All bottles, containers, boxes and packaging should be empty; this will help ensure that the machinery can sort items correctly.
- No need to squash – the machinery can sort the materials better if they're in their original shape. It's fine to squash items though if you're short of space.

Plastics:	All plastic bottles and lids, including bottles from the kitchen and bathroom, such as washing up liquid bottles, shampoo and conditioner. Pots, trays and tubs (with lids), including yoghurt pots, margarine tubs, punnets and food trays and carrier bags. No black plastic.
Metals:	Drink cans, food tins, clean aluminium foil and containers, empty aerosol cans
Glass:	All glass bottles and jars with lids
Mixed paper and card:	Newspapers, letters, magazines, junk mail, envelopes, shredded paper, plain greeting cards, plain wrapping paper (no foil), writing paper, directories and catalogues, paperback books, cardboard packaging, cereal boxes and corrugated cardboard boxes and tetra pak food and drink cartons

### ✗ No Thanks

Textiles, clothing and shoes - clothes suitable for re-use can be taken to charity shops or recycled at the designated textile banks located across the Borough, or taken to the Recycling and Household Waste Site
No black plastic, plastic plant pots or seed trays
No food wrappers, such as crisp packets, foil pouches, sweet and biscuit wrappers
No kitchen paper, tissues, cotton wool, wet wipes, sanitary products or nappies
No dirty or greasy paper or card, such as takeaway pizza boxes or sandwich packaging
No hard plastics such as plastic coat hangers, children's toys or plastic furniture
No general waste; food and drink, garden waste, pet bedding, polystyrene or foam food trays, building materials, broken glass, vases, drinking glasses, crockery, Pyrex, cookware, wallpaper, bubble wrap

# Clean up after your dog

The Council has agreed to enact a Public Space Protection Order (PSPO) regarding dogs across the Borough. Signage is in place to highlight the issues. A person in charge of a dog shall be guilty of an offence if they:

- Fail to remove faeces on land which the public, or any section of the public, has access (unless the owner can prove they have taken all reasonable precautions).
- Do not comply with a direction given to him by an authorised officer of the authority to put and keep the dog on a lead.
- Do not have an appropriate means to pick up dog faeces deposited by that dog.
- Allow the dog into a designated area where dogs are excluded, such as some children's play grounds.

The Council will be using Officers and CCTV cameras to enforce the Order, as dog fouling causes distress to many residents. Any breach of the Order could result in the issuing of a £100 fixed penalty notice or a fine on conviction of up to £1,000.

# Environmental Health

## Don't let fire 'takeaway' your livelihood

The Environmental Health Department and the Leicestershire Fire and Rescue service are working to tackle issues for people living above takeaways and other catering establishments, where the risks of fire are high.

Do you own a fast food outlet or takeaway and do you, your family or employees sleep at the premises? If so, fire safety law applies to you and you must take action.

In Leicestershire there have been a number of recent fires in businesses such as fast food outlets, takeaways, cafes and restaurants, where upper floors are being used for sleeping accommodation. These fires often result in significant financial loss, with a high risk of injury and even death.

It is particularly important to consider and put in place the right fire safety arrangements to protect not only the lives of you, your family, your employees and your customers, but also your property and your business.

In many cases it has come to light that people are sleeping in rooms and flats above businesses, often accessed by a single unprotected staircase from the main public or kitchen area of the building.

Recently a Leicester restaurant owner received a three month suspended prison sentence relating to a number of serious breaches of the Fire Safety Order. The company that operates the business was also ordered by Leicester Crown Court to pay a total of £8,000 in fines and court costs.

Andy Galway, Leicester Fire and Rescue Service's Head of Operational Support said: "Staff sleeping in a workplace must be able to escape safely in the event of a fire. We are determined to protect the lives of those living and working across Leicestershire and so we will continue to take action when businesses, large or small, do not take their fire safety responsibilities seriously".

## Make sure your favourite restaurant is safe

The Environmental Health Department are responsible for ensuring food premises within the Borough are operating safely and hygienically.

The system they use is governed by the Food Standards Agency, who administer the Food Hygiene rating scheme, through the website: <http://ratings.food.gov.uk/>.

## Understanding ratings

A food safety officer from the Council inspects a business to check that it follows food hygiene law so that the food is safe to eat. At the inspection, the officer will check the following three elements:

- how hygienically the food is handled - how it is prepared, cooked, re-heated, cooled and stored
- the physical condition of the business –including cleanliness, layout, lighting, ventilation, pest control and other facilities
- how the business manages ways of keeping food safe, looking at processes, training and systems to ensure good hygiene is maintained

The rating given shows how well a business is doing overall, based on standards found at the time of inspection.

## The rating scale

The hygiene standards found at the time of inspection are rated on a scale from 5 to 0. 5 means the hygiene standards are very good and fully comply with the law, while 0 means urgent improvement is needed.

To get the top rating, businesses must do well in all three elements referenced above. If the top rating is not given, the officer will explain to the business the necessary actions they can take to improve their hygiene rating.

## News from the Wigston Civic Society



### Trees and tree wardens

Wigston Civic Society promotes the planting of additional trees in the Borough and monitors work to trees in Conservation Areas, or those subject to a Tree Preservation Order (TPO).

In 2016, members planted four new trees on the approach to Willow Park from Central Avenue with funding from the Residents' Forum. The Society is now looking to plant additional trees on Holmden Avenue, which they hope will complement the new housing at the top of the road and help prevent damage by parking to the existing verges.

Owners of trees which are in Conservation Areas or which are subject to TPOs have a statutory responsibility to apply for permission to prune or remove those trees. Tree Wardens are asked for local advice when such an application is made. They also give early warning to the Council when works are required to ageing or damaged trees.

# News from the Wigston Civic Society

Walking is an increasingly popular activity for all age groups, but it is not always easy to find footpaths and cycle ways which provide suitable routes for rambles or allow traffic-free access. There are public rights of way such as Fludes Lane in Oadby and the footpaths in Wigston leading to the canal which provide valuable links to open space, in addition to preserving the heritage.

However, there are some historic routes which are not on the Definitive Map (official record) and this could be particularly significant when new development is proposed.

Definitive public rights of way, including footpaths, bridleways and by-ways have been recorded since legislation in 1949, but the Countryside and Rights of Way Act 2000 states that all rights of way which existed before 1949 and have not been recorded by 2026 will be extinguished. Ramblers, horse-riders and cyclists are concerned that this will mean some existing or historic routes will be lost.

To find out which paths are rights of way, you can view the Definitive Maps for the local area in Oadby Library or contact the County Council via [www.leicestershire.gov.uk/leisure-and-community/parks-and-outdoor-activities](http://www.leicestershire.gov.uk/leisure-and-community/parks-and-outdoor-activities). If you know of a route which may be in danger of being lost, or find that a path you use is not on the Definitive Map, contact Wigston Civic Society via their website.



## 40 years of local action

This year Wigston Civic Society is celebrating the 40th anniversary of its founding in 1978. At that time Bell Street was a two-way street being the main A50 road from Leicester to Northampton, and home to a junior 'board' school which developers wanted to demolish.

The Society was formed to try to save the school and though this battle was lost and the school demolished, the Society has continued to keep an eye on what is being proposed for Wigston, South Wigston and Kilby Bridge, with particular emphasis on planning applications in the six Conservation Areas within these settlements.

The Society has also been working to make the area a better place in which to live, work and shop, by carrying out projects including:

- Creating a garden at the corner of Bushloe End and Launceston Road.
- Erecting several blue plaques for local people of prominence
- Creating the 10-mile Two Steeples circular walk as a millennium project
- Erecting a plaque commemorating the link between the diamond jubilee of Queen Victoria and Queen Elizabeth II on Bell Street
- Replacing a lost plaque to commemorate the reopening of South Wigston Station in 1976.

## A walk around central Wigston Magna

Recently, members of the Wigston Civic Society took an evening stroll around the central area of Leicester Road and Bell Street in Wigston Magna, particularly observing the areas behind shops.

Land to the rear of shops to the east of Leicester Road fronting onto the car park and at the rear of the Arcade was in a poor state. The Society ask that shop owners and landlords pay attention to these parts of their properties, as they are on public view and can affect their reputation in the eye of the public.

Despite this, the overall impression while walking the two main roads was good and clean, especially with the flower displays for East Midlands in Bloom.

## Overhanging hedges

Over the last six months the Wigston Civic Society has run a campaign for residents of the Borough to report any issues with hedges or trees overhanging on to pavements, which make navigating the pavements hazardous or dangerous.

They have had a lot of feedback which they passed onto the Leicestershire County Council Highways Department, who will inspect the sites and contact the owners.
