The Royal Oak Inn Leicester Road Wigston Magna



The old Royal Oak public house was situated in Leicester Road at Wigston Fields. Built in the mid 1800's it was kept in 1877 by Leonard Sibson, who was also a market gardener. Fred Thorpe was the last licensee in the late 1930's until the premises were demolished for rebuilding. He also had



Ruskington Farm. Nowadays, Ruskington Drive and Thorpe Drive, near Grange Road, reserve the names.

THE ROYAL OAK INN, LEICESTER ROAD, WIGSTON

Buildings current use - public house Architects - unknown Built circa 1900 (believed)

The Royal Oak is a substantial stand alone building. The original (built prior to 1886) Royal Oak or Royal Hotel as it was formerly known was much different in design terms to the current property. It is situated within a prominent location on a relatively large plot fronting Leicester Road. The building has been designed and built with a curved façade, built of brick under a tiled roof. There are four dominant chimney stacks. The building is currently being converted into a supermarket.

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Age Yes. The building was believed to have been built circa 1900. Architectural Yes. The building has a rarely seen curved façade and roof line with large prominent chimney stacks. Group Value No. Historic Yes. The current building replaced a much older inn on the site. Rarity Yes. The design is very individual and rare. Social/Communal Yes. It is still used as a public house and a place for people to gather.
