The Cookoo bridge I knew was the blue brick built arched bridge that carried the Leicester to Rugby railway line over the Countesthorpe Road near its junction with Lansdowne Grove next to the old Premier Drum factory at South Wigston. It was known to me as the Cookoo Bridge because your voice echoed when you walked under it on the raised path at the side. As a young boy I would always call out "Cookoo" as I walked or rode on my bike under it and listen out for the echo. I suppose this "custom" was started by my parents when I was very young and was always referred to by this name. After the line was closed the 1960's the bridge was demolished and the road levelled. This allowed double-decker buses to run to Countesthope over the two hump-back bridges over the canal and River Sence - a bit of a squeeze! Later on these bridges were rebuilt and widened.
